HOPE FOR THE BALD HEAD

Sewing Hairs on Scalp is Proving Successful—Fine Gold Wire Are Used.

A method of sewing hairs in the human scalp in cases of partial or total baldness has been successfully used in several instances by Doctor Ssekely, at the hospital of Saint Stephens at Budapest, and a report appears in the London Times.

The number of hairs "planted" in the head of a patient has been as many as 50,000. One hundred hairs are drawn through punctures in the scalp at every square centimeter, and as both ends are left free, the number is thus 200, or over one thousand to each square inch. Very fine gold wires are used, one five-hundredth of an inch in diameter, and the long hairs from a woman's head are attached to the middle of these. The gold loop or knot acts as an "anchor," and after sterilization is introduced into the subcutaneous tissue, where it is slightly twisted, and holds the hair permanently in position. It is stated that 500 hairs can thus be introduced into the scalp within three-quarters of an hour.
