Ford Motor Company Contracts for Immense Space in Automobile Building on Fair Grounds.

SIGHT A WONDERFUL ONE.

Parts Will Go into Building Lifestyles Pieces of Metal and Wood will be used in the building. The building is being Traveling Under Their Own Power.

The Ford Motor company will build automobiles as an attraction at the Michigan State Fair. Officials of the great concern met with General Manager, Dickinson and other cities. A contract was signed for one entire side of the Automobile building at the Fair grounds and for half the opposite side. The portions of the building in reality will be a branch of the immense plant, and here twenty-five cars will be produced each day.

The space will be made over into a Ford assembling plant, such as the ones now in operation in San Francisco, Walkerville and other cities. All the machinery necessary in the final assembling of the car will be installed, and a sufficient number of employees will man the branch to keep it up to top production every day. These actual operations will be supplemented by the Ford company's motion picture exhibits, which will show the many activities that enter into the manufacture of Ford cars. A theater will be improvised in the building, and in this the pictures will be shown.

Nothing Like It Anywhere.

Great interest attaches to the announcement because the exhibit will be the most novel and upon the most extensive scale of any ever shown at such an exhibition in this country. Processes of manufacture of different articles have been demonstrated many times, but never before has anything of this magnitude been attempted.

The miniature plant will be arranged that the parts—lives, pieces of steel, wire, leather and wood—will at one end of the building and are so joined together that they emerge at the other end finished automobiles, ready to go into useful service to the motor cars. The cars will be complete when they leave the building and will be driven from the Fair grounds to the shipping platform.

Gets Exhibit That's Worthy.

"We have sought for a long time to get an automobile exhibit that was worthy of Michigan, the greatest automobile producing state in the Union, and I am pleased to announce that at last we have it," said General Manager Dickinson of the Fair. "The matter was presented to Mr. Ford and his associates, and they saw it in the same light we did."

"I never heard of any exhibit of this magnitude before, and the people who come to the Fair this year will be glad to say they saw an automobile built there. It will be something to remember."

M. A. C. OWES FOUNDING TO MICHIGAN STATE FAIR.

General Manager Dickinson Tells Interesting History of Institutions.

The Michigan Agricultural college, the foremost institution of its kind in the United States, owes its existence largely to the Michigan State Fair. It was founded by the Michigan State Fair, in 1847 and after successive exhibitions of the state's agricultural products and of its possibilities had pointed the need.

"What a splendid thing this Fair be! how it encourages me to raise better and larger crops and women to make their homes more pleasant to live in," said these pioneers. "But look at the acres here are left to drain, to cultivate and to bring to their fullest fruit. These are tasks for trained men and in order to teach them we must have a school. The Fair then, not only be an exhibition place for the state's products; it will be a means of showing to the people the scientific methods that are pursued there and what they are accomplishing."

And the action was suited to the word. The legislature, at the solicitation of Governor Ransom, the first president of the State Agricultural society, passed an act creating the school. That the Fair might carry out its demonstration program it was decreed that it should be held in cities in different portions of the state.

"And year after year the Fair trotted about north and south, the elite riders when the state was young," says G. W. Dickinson, general manager.

"There wasn't much of a Fair to move on the start, and the directors of the plan worked pretty well. Along about 1860, however, it began to present many difficulties.

"The directors found it too much of a job to put a \$25,000 plant on wheels and send it across the state, especially as it was growing bigger all the time. The improvement of transportation facilities made it far easier for the people to go to the mountain than for the reverse to be the case, and the permanent location at Detroit was chosen.

"The wisdom of the step soon became apparent. Buildings especially designed to house the stock and the other displays could be erected, the grounds could be beautified and the Fair could become what its directors hoped it might be—a fitting exhibition of the state's progress."
