### Rats in England.

Deputy Councilor Lether J. Parr, at Sheffield, England, made a report on rats. The report was made in Sheffield are infested with rats, writes Mr. Parr, and many attempts have been made to exterminate them. In the work, however, little damage has been done, and it is the duty occasionally to employ a professional rat catcher, who captures about 100 rats a night and is paid the dollar for a night's work. Such a calling is to be despised by the fact that there is a ready sale to the sporting men for the rats caught. Several exterminators are in use in Sheffield, all more or less effective. An opportunity will shortly be offered to demonstrate the value of the American rat exterminators. Church of England bishops recently proposed an amendment offered by the bishop of Lincoln to eliminate the use of the word "obey" by women in the marriage service. The bishop of Winchester said: "I cannot help thinking it is a regrettable thing that the word should continue. I cannot say that without saying mat in an ideal marriage service I should desire to see some reference to the leadership of the man in the home." And the bishops avoided a decision by having the amendment withdrawn.

### Nothing Really News New.

The name comes from the Saxon "cric" or "cryc," a crooked stick—an obvious reference to the bat with which it is played. Wherever the English have colonized the game is played, and in many of the British possessions it has become popular with the natives, notably in New Zealand.
