Lansing.—The twenty-fifth convention of the Michigan Federation of Labor adjourned here Friday night after selecting Traverse City for the next annual convention. The fight for the convention city was thrashed out on "wet" and "dry" lines. Placed in nomination by delegates from that city was forced to withdraw before the election on account of the sentiment expressed against that city because it is dry.

President Claude Taylor, of Grand Rapids, was re-elected by a vote of 21 cast for St. Ignace, St. Ignace, of Detroit. Other officers elected are: vice-president, George E. Block, of Kalamazoo; second vice-president, William L. Longley, of Lansing; and president, A. A. Poole, of Detroit.
