European War News

The British collier Newlyn landed 130 survivors at Falmouth from the liner Wayford, injured by a mine or torpedo sixty miles off Bally Island.

Bulgarian forces are continuing their attacks on the Serbian frontier. They assailed Serbia, took Zankov and forced the Serbian troops to retire at Malchik.

Five hundred fifty Zeppelins and aeroplanes have been assembled by the Germans for a raid over England in June, according to information just brought to Paris.

Last of Germany's sea raiders, the Kronprinz Wilhelm, swept seaward. Her crew facing starvation, her bunkers empty, harried from New York harbor by the perpetual guard of British cruisers, sought sanctuary at Newport News, Va.

Lord Kitchener of England has called on Canada for a second expeditionary force. The House of Commons at Ottawa, Ont., by Premier Sir Richard Borden.

The British steamer Heraldo, the first of the new class of ships built under charter of the commission for relief in Belgium, has either been torpedoed or sunk by a mine in the North Sea.

Official reports given at Paris declare the important position of the L'Espere, which dominates the plain of Woerwe, now is completely in the hands of the allies.

German troops again have established themselves upon the Christmas of the Year in West Flanders, driving the Belgians out of Driest Graeben.

President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt left New Haven, Conn., for the first time in four years. They acted as pallbearers at the funeral of Prof. Thomas Lonsbury of Yale.

Major Donn M. Roberts, one of the 27 men convicted by a federal court at Indianapolis for participation in the conspiracy to defraud the government in the election in Terre Haute on November 3, was sentenced by Judge Anderson to six years in Leavenworth prison and to pay a fine of \$5,000. In all 116 men, of whom 100 were guilty, were sentenced.

An attempt to wreck a Chesapeake & Ohio passenger train at Washington was frustrated by a boy, who flagged the train in time to prevent it from running into a pile of logs.

Work on three large submarines for the United States government will begin at the Seattle shipyard, and Dock company's yard within thirty days. The boats will cost \$1,600,000.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT EXPERTS GIVE RESULTS OF STUDY AND EXPERIMENT ON CHOOSING AND CLEANING VEGETABLES

Care Must Precede the Process of Cooking-Try Combinations-Some Suggestions on the Proper Way of Serving.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture. Careful sorting and cleaning of vegetables must precede any process of cooking. Medium-sized vegetables and salads to be preferred to the overlarge. Food plants selected in normal growth are liable to be tender and crisp, while those having abundant moisture in the stems and making normal growth are crisp, tender and well flavored.

The shorter the time and journey between the table and the better for green plants. It is wiser not to gather vegetables while wilted or otherwise showing the effects of the day's heat, but rather to pick them after the dew has evaporated in the morning, or in the cool of the late afternoon. Wilted vegetables can be revived in the refrigerator, but may be improved by careful washing and removal of inferior portions, and then soaking in cold water, with salt added, for an hour or two.

The soaking of vegetables in cold water to freshen them probably explains the fact that the hoarsest of vegetables when they contain a certain amount of water in the cells, are softened and become palatable. This water may be extracted by washing in cold water, and the water so obtained may be used for cooking.

Often it is convenient and wise to cook a double portion of a vegetable and serve part of it a second day in a different form. This should not be attempted in warm weather unless a refrigerator is available, as the vegetables will spoil. Ordinarily a vegetable in a refrigerator should be covered and cooled quickly and kept in a cold place which will keep 24 or 48 hours in cool weather.

Most vegetables are lacking in fat, so we add fat in the form of meat, butter, oil or cream when preparing them for the table, or we serve them with fat meats, etc. As far as possible, the human body gets its fat from the vegetable which is cooked with fat. Good olive oil and thick cream are the best. Butter should be melted and hence always used as a cooking fat.

Whenever a vegetable dish, other than dried beans, peas, or other legumes, is served, it is best to serve it with a small amount of starch, such as potatoes, or a small amount of sugar, such as carrots.

Though only a few are common on our tables, many of the most nutritious vegetables which are not used need to be experimented with. Starchy vegetables with a succulent one, or one lacking in flavor with another that will give relief.
