WEST MAPLE AVENUE BIRMINGHAM

An Ordinance prohibiting the burning of large quantities of refuse.

Section 1. That any person who shall burn or cause to be burned, on any lot or premises, any large quantity of refuse, or other material, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500, for each offence.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect from the fourth day of May, A. D. 1915.

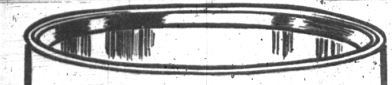
