J. Thomas Daily is building a house on his 20 acre land here, for a home.

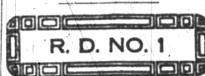
Mrs. Henry Sullivan, of Toledo, was the guest of her sister, Mrs. Charles Smith, last week.

A month ago there were seven vacant houses here. Now nearly all are taken and three new houses are under construction.

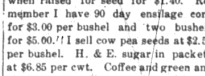
Mr. and Mrs. R. R. McClelland have returned to their home in Virgil, Montana, after an extended visit here with relatives and friends.

The third grade language has been studying the Eskimo and just completed making an Eskimo book, a splendid piece of work.

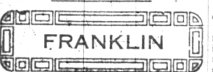
The eighth grade are greatly inspired with Lincoln's Gettysburg address and are reviewing with great interest for the grade examination.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Bingham and Mrs. Alf. Curran were Redford visitors Thursday of last week.

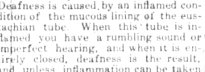
Florence and Arnold Bingham entertained some of their young friends Saturday afternoon. All report an enjoyable time.
