Jones for the purpose of passing an ordinance providing for the issuing of bonds of the village of Birmingham in the sum of forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars, and providing for the payment of the same and interest thereon. Also for the purpose of determining the charges for special assessments for Woodward and Maple avenue pavement.

Hewitt moved, Harris seconded, that ordinance number seventy-two, providing for the issuing of bonds by the village of Birmingham in the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and providing for the payment of the same and interest thereon, be adopted.

Motion carried.

Clizbe moved, Hewitt seconded, that the water main be extended on Park street north to lot 87.

Motion carried.

Clizbe moved, Hewitt seconded, that assessment be levied on a paving assessment as per schedule attached, showing to be laid, districts and front footage of abutting property.

Motion carried.

### WILSON

Makes Good and Will Succeed Him-

Self, Senator Ashurst of Arizona

Sees No Other Way for U. S.

Pausing briefly in an itinerary whose purpose comprehends the dispensing of some of President Wilson's gentle diplomacy through Michigan and adjoining states, Senator Henry F. Ashurst of Arizona, stopped long enough in Detroit recently to express his belief that the president will be re-nominated at the democratic national convention without a single dissenting vote.

Since March 4 last the senator has covered 14,000 miles, embracing a territory from California to New York.

He has talked to cowboys and bankers, lawyers and professional men, and, after carefully weighing and digesting the sentiment he has found, he declares that Woodrow Wilson is today 2,000,000 votes stronger than his party. He says that if there were a presidential election today Wilson would carry New York handsily and would come closer to sweeping Michigan than any living democrat.

"I WANT NO OTHER LEADER

"Woodrow Wilson will run for president," he said, "because he will have no other choice. I measure my words when I say that he will be re-elected president without any trouble. The people will have no other leader. It was a mistake for both Woodrow Wilson and for the United States that he became president at such a time—fortunate for him because the times made him the one great outstanding figure in civilization today, and fortunate for the United States, because he is the only calm, resourceful leader whose peculiar abilities enabled him to steer the country safely through the fight over the tariff and currency bills.

"PEEL SAFE WITH WILSON

"From the standpoint of the great mass of people there is but one question, and that relates to the war in Europe. The people know they have the one man to lead them safely through."

Woodrow Wilson is that man, because he is Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Jackson and Mark Twain rolled into one. He has the exalted patriotism of Lincoln, the iron will of Jackson, the rich and delicate humor of Twain.

"If public opinion congressmen are in a bad way. They can Wilson openly for the sake of their constituency and they praise him privately, because there is no other thing for them to do."
