## European War News

The committee of the radical party in Rome has unanimously adopted a motion declaring Italy's participation in the European conflict in Indonesian. The committee is in the opinion that the satisfaction of her aspirations and the protection of her interests. The radicals of Padua voted for intervention and denunciation of triple alliance.

Reported in Berlin that the German cruiser Karlsruhe during the past few days has sunk 13 merchant ships flying the flag of the allies.

Armed British merchant vessel York, sailing for several days, believed lost with her entire crew. A number of bodies have been found on the north coast of Ireland. It is believed she foundered or struck a mine.

That one of the British warships engaged in the North sea battle with the German armored cruiser, Blücher, 15,000 tons, was damaged, though not seriously, by the German frigate was reported by the master of the Dutch steamer trawler Erica, which has just arrived at Yarmouth.

Benjamin Morel, United States consul agent at Dunkirk, France, was injured when the American consulate was damaged by a bomb during the German air raid. Combustibles of Uruguay and Norway also were damaged. Morel is a Frenchman.

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Telegrams from Berlin admit seven Zeppelins raided England, and only six had returned to Wilhelmshaven.

British steamer Durward has been torpedoed by a German submarine. The crew was saved. The Durward was struck by a torpedo 22 miles off the Massachusetts coast.

German airplanes attacked Dunkirk and nearby coast towns. They dropped 80 bombs. There are 20 now a victim of the enemy attacks. Seven were dead. French and English airplanes brought down one of the hostile machines.

More than a thousand German lawyers had been killed in battle up to December 28, says a statement from Washington. The number of lawyers in the reports is 1,071. Six of these were judges, state attorneys or other members of the judicial department of the government.

**Domestic**

Schooner yacht Idler owned by J. P. Jefferson of Warren, Pa., lost on Delaware shore. It is believed Capt. Robert H. Harding and his crew of 14 men perished.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in testifying before the federal commission on industrial relations at New York, strongly defended his attitude in the Standard Oil strike, but at the same time he advised the opinion that it is just as proper for labor to organize for its own protection as for capital to do so.

Industrial unrest is the necessary condition of political liberty and industrialism. Politically we are free, as we possibly can be, industrially we are not because of the great power held by the corporations and their absolute domination of the state. These statements were made before the federal commission on industrial relations at New York by Louis D. Brandeis.

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The lower house of the legislature at Montgomery, Ala., repealed the state-wide prohibition bill. The governor's veto by a vote of 73 to 29. The measure now needs only the approval of the senate to become a law. It goes into effect June 30.

## PUBLIC DOMAIN TO DO WORK

Anti-Cigarette Bill Makes its Appearance

Lansing-Senator Samuel Odell, of Shelby, will introduce a bill in the Michigan legislature to abolish the office of state game fish and forestry warden and the office of Michigan fish commission and placing these departments under the control of the public domain commission.

As soon as the bill shall take effect the public domain shall appoint a chief for each of the four divisions, each of whom shall be an executive member of the commission. The salary of each division chief shall not exceed \$3,000 per year.

Each chief must give bond to the amount of \$3,000 for the faithful performance of his duty and shall hold office at the pleasure of the commission, but not shall be removed on account of religious or political opinions.

It is set forth in Senator Odell's bill that each of the chiefs shall be chosen from among men known to the commission by personal or practical knowledge of all matters pertaining to the laws and duties governing the divisions to which they are appointed.

The chief of the division of protection of the public domain commission will appoint at least twenty competent men to act as game wardens, fish officers and fish protectors. The salary of the deputies will be fixed by the commission but will not be less than \$250 per year.

The chief of the division of fish culture will perform all the duties now required by the superintendent of the Michigan fish commission and may appoint such assistants as the public domain commission shall direct.

The chief of the division of game propagation and the chief of the division of deer hunting licenses, game hunting licenses, commercial fishing licenses, shall be pooled into a combined fund for the fish and game protection and propagation fund.

At the present time the members of the public domain commission are Secretary S. C. Coleman, Auditor General V. C. P. Puller, Auditor of the University John C. Beck, Member of State Board of Agriculture A. J. Roberts and Member of State Board of Education C. C. Carter. C. Carter is secretary of the commission.

Many of the members of the legislature have expressed themselves as being favorable to the Odell bill and with the backing that it will receive from the public domain commission it is believed that it stands an excellent chance to become a law.

Representative Charles D. Symonds of Menominee, presented a bill for the purpose of abolishing the public domain school training. This applies to district as well as city and village territories.

Representative Charles Foot, of Kent, put in a bill to permit teachers to handle the eighth, ninth and tenth grades in their own schools.

Senator Walter says that any good business man would be willing to expend \$25,000 to look over a proposition involving the expenditure of \$12,000, 000, the approximately amount of an appropriation of the legislature two years ago.

It is said that the fire at the Michigan School for the Deaf at Flint, Mich., was not a fire but a gas explosion which has been prevented, had the entire legislature committee visited the institution and followed the recommendation of the committee. Only a few of the committee attended and the things needed to afford better protection against fire were stricken from the bill.

Senator Walter says that the cost of that fire would be sufficient to pay the expenses of trips to all state fire stations by the committees for a period of 180 years.

# NEW PRIMARY BILL IS INTRODUCED

SENATOR KELLEY HAS MEASURE TO REPEAL PRESENT LAW.

RESTORES THE ENROLLMENT

Only Change From Present Law Is to Repeal Primary Law.

One Party Casting Votes in Primary of Another.

Lansing-Senator Louis L. Kelley, of Farwell, will introduce a bill to repeal the present primary law and place upon the statute books a primary law similar to the one in effect two years ago, restoring the party enrollment and requiring voters to declare their political affiliation before participating in any primary election.
