KILLED ON BOAT

Harry Coney, Once a Birmingham Boy, Is Killed by a Maniac on Steamer from S. America.

In the Detroit Free Press, dated Bridgetown, Barbados, July 5.—On the arrival here of the British steamship Temyon, from Rio Janeiro for New York, the ship's officers reported that Caesar Brava, formerly of the United States navy, had shot and killed Harry Coney, an American, on board the Temyon and had then turned the weapon on himself. Brava was taken to the hospital in a dying condition. Coney's body is still aboard the Temyon. The shooting occurred Sunday night.

It is said that Brava was a madman. Particulars are not given. Harry Coney is a nephew of Mrs. Nellie Camp, of Woodward avenue. His father is John E. Coney, of Jackson, Mich. Twice each year it was his habit to go to South America and purchase immense quantities of fax, raised in the Rio Janeiro country.

THREE INJURED D. U. R. IS HOST

Auto Backed Before Interurban to Escape Steam Train—89-Fear Old Lady Dying.

An aged woman so badly injured that she cannot recover and two other persons were critically hurt, in a collision Sunday evening at 6:25 o'clock between a north bound D. U. R. car and a large eight-cylinder touring car at Clark's crossing, just north of this village. The car belonged to Edmund R. Morris, who owns and lives on the George Dawson farm, a mile and a half northeast of Birmingham, which he purchased this spring. Mr. Morris and his wife and her aged mother, Mrs. Sophia Brunswick, were passengers in the machine, which was being driven by a nephew of Mr. Morris, named Holt. The driver escaped uninjured.

Clark's crossing at this point intersects both the D. U. R. and the Grand Trunk tracks, with only a short distance between the two. It was while trying to prevent a collision with a steam train that the automobile was backed into the north bound electric car. The occupants of the car saw the steam train approaching and Mr. Morris told his nephew to back off the crossing. They failed to note the approach of the electric car which crashed into the rear of the automobile at a high rate of speed.

The impact of the collision threw the three passengers out. Mrs. Brunswick sustained a broken hip and the back of her head was crushed. Her injuries are believed to be fatal. Mrs. Morris received cuts on the head, and one of her knees and her back were injured. Mr. Morris had the muscles of his back torn loose and was unconscious when picked up.

The three victims were carried to the home of Ross Hutelinson, nearby, where they were attended by Dr. N. T. Shaw, of Birmingham. They were later removed to the Morris farm home.

Motorman C. E. Rodes, of Birmingham, was in charge of the interurban car which figured in the accident. He escaped uninjured. The fender of the car was torn off the interurban, but it was otherwise uninjured.
