European War News

German army headquarters gave out the following statement: An English attack north of Ypres and a French attack against Sochez were repulsed with sanguinary losses.

Preparations are being made in Constantinople for a siege of the town, which is expected soon, says a dispatch to Athens.

The big British steamship Anglo-Californian, hurled into Queenstown harbor, a veritable floating shambles after having outrun a German submarine. Captain Farlow and eleven members of the crew were killed.

The British assertion that German submarines had changed their tactics and henceforth would sink fewer vessels was officially declared by the German government at Berlin to be "absolutely untrue."

Three British steamers, the Gasconade, Ingleborough and Tower, were sunk by German submarines in the vicinity of the Selby coast of South Ireland, it was announced in London.

The German battleship Wittelsbach, which sank the British ship, was under the water line from a battle with Russian warships in the Baltic, was returned to Kiel. A naval battle has been fought of the east coast of Gotland island.

The German forces have occupied the Russian positions at Krasnik, in the southern district of Russia, according to German army headquarters. Russian forces in the western part of Zamosc have been driven back. The fortress of Zamosc itself has been captured.

A British submarine in the Sea of Marmora sank the Turkish transport Aqueduct, which was full of troops, according to British correspondents. The exchange telephone company at London.

Domestic

It was reported that he was placed in the capitol at Washington the internal message will be sent to the senate wing. He went to the capitol with the purpose of inducing Mr. Morgan to stop the export of arms and munitions from the United States to the allies, and thereby aid the war.

State-wide prohibition in Alabama is in effect. Every saloon and dispensary in the state was closed Wednesday night.

Diaz was born at Oaxaca September 15, 1830. For 25 years he ruled Mexico, all of that time with the exception of four years as president, which remained in office until his resignation in 1911.

Mexican Revolt

Fighting for Mexico City has been going on in the suburbs 15 days. Zapala's army and armed civilians are directly attacking the Aguascalientes entrance. Gen. Raphael Chaves of the capital forces has been killed. In the Zapala there is looting. All business houses have been barricaded.

Desperate conditions in Mexico City, with unheeded mobs and looting, are forcing the United States government at Washington from Vera Cruz by a courier who left the Mexican capital last Friday, June 25.

Chihuahua reports that a temporary armistice has been declared near Encarnacion, south of Aguascalientes, between Villa and Carranza.

Foreign

Premier Asquith announced in London the engagement of his eldest daughter, Miss Cecily Asquith, to Mr. Asquith's principal secretary.

A verdict of guilty was returned in London against George Jackson, who was charged with murdering three of his brides to secure his insurance. He was sentenced to death.

The Holland-American line steamship Nieuwe Amsterdam, having 1,400 persons on board, bound from New York to Rotterdam, ran down in a fog by an unidentified steamer while anchored in the Downs.

Washington

The fallroads traversing what is known as "Western Classification Territory" will receive the advance in rates for which they asked. It was announced unofficially at Washington.

The United States is seriously considering taking over the wireless station at Sayville, L. I., one of the two great plants which direct communication between the United States and Germany is maintained. The alternative station at Tucker, N. Y., already is under government control. Evidence of alleged violations of neutrality at Sayville has been gathered by the department of commerce at Washington.

Labor Secretary Wilson, Assistant Attorney General Warren and Secretary Lansing had a long conference at Washington. Wilson reported the plan of deporting German agents to Spain as an undesirable alien was considered.

Washington's Fourth of July was eminently "safe and sane." "Americanization day" proved very popular throughout the U. S.

A deficit of over \$10,000,000 in postal revenues is forecast by Postmaster General Burleson in a statement issued at Washington.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, was operated upon for appendicitis at the naval hospital at Washington.

An explosion caused slight damage in the public reception room of the senate wing of the capitol at Washington. The damage, which is confined almost exclusively to the reception room, was estimated by Superintendent Wood of the capitol at about six hundred dollars.
