The main features of the house are the large living room and library extending through the center. The living room is 27 feet long by 13 feet.

The second floor has a spacious billiard room 16 x 22 feet and bed room 12 x 18 feet, a servant's room 11 x 11 feet with a servant's bathroom 5 x 10 feet.

The interior of the house will contain 12 French doors and the entire interior of the house will be finished in white marble.

There will be a pergola on the west of the house with a drive running through and entirely around the house, and a porch at the rear 20 x 5 feet.

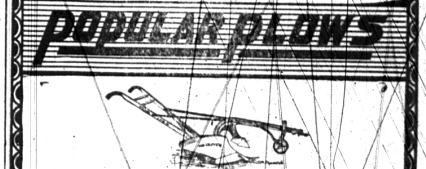
