MORTGAGE SALE.

TO COMPROMISE

Joint Committee Compromise with Donators and Build 11.3 Miles Road This Year.

One and a third miles of the Detroit road between Pontiac and Birmingham will be improved with a concrete road this year, according to the determination expressed at a joint meeting of the road commissioners held recently at the court house in Pontiac. The remainder of the stretch will be graded, however, this summer and the joint committees have promised to complete the concrete road next year if the people who volunteered to donate \$18,000 toward the work, are willing to continue the time for the completion of the work until July 1, 1916. It is believed that this arrangement will be satisfactory, although the promoters of the donation were unable to state positively whether it would be until after a conference has been held with some of the larger contributors. E. P. Waldron was chairman of the committee which obtained the subscriptions and states the arrangement will probably be satisfactory.

Members of the road committee of the board of supervisors held a private conference preliminary to a meeting

with the road commissioners. They decided that the county would not be able to pay its share toward the entire proposed work and at the same time carry out the road building plan of a mile of road for each township each year. The state highway commission and the contractor engaged in building the concrete road between Birmingham and Royal Oak, also advised that it would be better to grade the steep hills and fill the hollows this summer and allow them to stand one year before any attempt is made to lay a concrete road. It would have been impossible to collect state reward money on some portions of the road without reducing the grade.

Both the supervisors' committee and the road commissioners signed an agreement to complete the concrete road between Pontiac and Birmingham before July 1, 1916; weather conditions permitting, if the donors of the \$18,000 would extend their offer until that date. This agreement was unanimously entered into by all the supervisors and the two members of the road commission who were present.

It was moved by Supervisor C. H. Newton and supported by Supervisor G. Ross Thompson that the commissioners proceed as soon as possible with the work of laying a concrete road on the Detroit road for a mile and a third commencing at the Pontiac city limits and running south in Bloomfield township. Bloomfield township did not receive any good roads last year.
