There being a quorum present, the council declared in session at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

Moved by Trustee Clizbe and supported by Trustee Hewitt that the following resolution be adopted and accepted:

Whereas, in the judgment of this council, the opening of Knox street fifty feet wide from its present easterly terminus in said village easterly on its present course to Adams avenue is a necessary public improvement, and

Whereas, it has been made to appear to this council that all of the owners of lands necessary to be taken for the opening of said street are willing to dedicate such lands to the

village for the purpose of a public street and highway as aforesaid, excepting one William Lutz Sr. and Mary Lutz, his wife, and,

Whereas, it appears that said William Lutz Sr. and Mary, his wife are the owners of lands situated in the village of Birmingham as described as follows: All that portion of lot also of E. C. Poppington's addition to the village of Birmingham described as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner of said lot Nine (9) acres east of the north line thereof 124 feet; thence southerly along the east line thereof 217 feet; thence south 89 degrees, 30 minutes west 126 feet to the west line of said lot 9; thence northerly along the west line thereof 22 feet to the place of beginning; and that portion of lot ten of said subdivision described as beginning at the southeast corner thereof; thence northerly along the westerly line thereof 18 feet; thence north 89 degrees, 30 minutes east 123 feet; thence southerly and parallel with the west line thereof 283 feet; thence westerly along the south line of said lot 10, 126 feet to the place of beginning.

Also that portion of said lot ten described as follows: Beginning at the south line of said lot ten which is 126 feet easterly from the southwesterly corner of said lot measured along said southerly line, thence northerly and parallel with the east line of said lot 28.3 feet; thence north 88 degrees, 40 minutes east 26 feet and three-eighths inches to the westerly line of said lot; thence southerly along the said easterly line of said lot 28.3 feet to a point in the southerly line thereof; thence westerly along said southerly line 26 feet, one and three-eighths inches to the place of beginning, and

Whereas, it is necessary to acquire said lands in order to open said street as aforesaid, and

Whereas, said William Lutz Sr. and Mary, his wife have refused to dedicate or to sell said lands for the opening of said street. Now therefore be it

Resolved, that the opening of Knox street fifty feet wide, from its present easterly terminus in said village, easterly on its present course to Adams avenue in said village is a necessary public improvement. Be it further

Resolved, that said improvement is for the use and benefit of the public and that it is necessary to take and appropriate the private property above described for the aforesaid public use and purpose. Be it further

Resolved, that the village attorney and he is hereby instructed and required to forthwith institute in the name of said village, before a Justice of the Peace within the county of Oakland, such proceedings as are necessary to condemn and appropriate said property for the aforesaid public use and purpose.

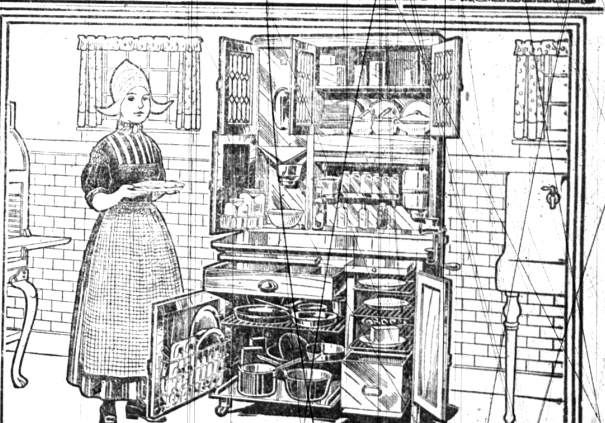
