As a member of your body I have supported every measure for actual public improvements and have neglected my business to devote time upon matters of vital importance to the city. Having fulfilled my obligation, my conscience was clear up to last night's meeting, when, after two weeks' deliberation, not one of you would support the long heralded resignation of Warren D. Clizbe.

In the face of public sentiment, it is incumbent upon me to resign, as my time can be used to better purpose than to further sit in a body of men who are hypnotized by the eloquence of one man that has, and is, running the affairs of the Board, with injustice to many tax payers.
