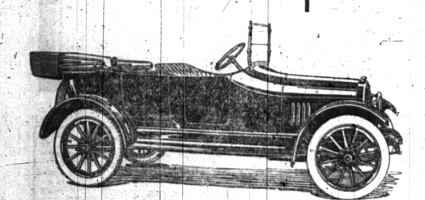

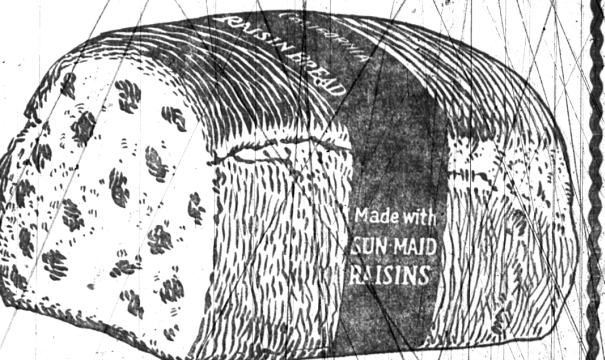
ST. JAMES' CHURCH, NOTES
