Harry A. Lamb and Morris Wattle after a week's vacation, have returned to Lansing to resume their studies at the M. A. C.

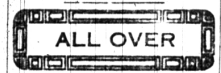
Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith attended a party at Highland Park last Thursday given at the home of their son, Fred. Ten guests were present.

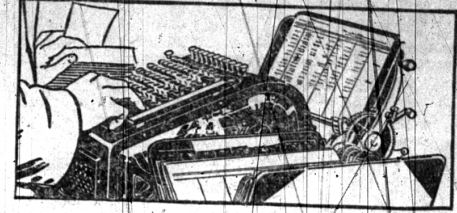
