Hartmannsweller-Kopf in the Vosges Is Scene of Constant Fighting. TRENCHES FIVE YARDS APART

Character of Warfare That Has Engaged Armies in Alsace for Seventeen Months—Capture of Cemetery Costs More Dead Than Were Ever Buried in It.

London.—The following is published in the London Daily Express from its correspondent in Paris: "When the snow-laden wind comes roaring over the Alsatian hills, its icy breath chilling the body to the bone, the 'poilus,' huddled together, many feet below the ground, draw their blankets closer around them...

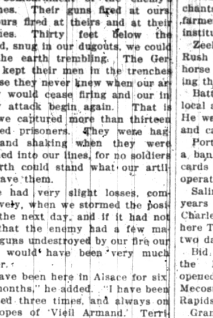
