OBITUARY.

George H. Mitchell and wife attended the funeral of their aunt, Mrs. Henry P. Mitchell, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Clara Connor, at Alma, Michigan. Funeral services were held in the Church at the Mt. Clemens Cemetery and interment followed.

Emily Parker was born in Ohio Township, Washtenaw County, State of Michigan, on May 17, 1831. In 1851, she married Joseph Messmore and went to Macon County to live. Two children, James and Frank, were born of this union. In 1854, Joseph Messmore died and in July, 1856, she married Henry P. Mitchell. Seven children, Joseph, Clara, Edward, Albert, Alfred, Addie, and Howard were born to them. In 1896, they left the farm near Mt. Clemens and moved to Ulfes, where they resided for 25 years. From there they moved to Rochester, Michigan, which was their home for several years. Mr. Clemens then became their home and in 1900, Death entered and took Mr. Mitchell. For the last four years, Mrs. Mitchell made her home with her daughter, Mrs. H. S. Connor, at Alma. She leaves to mourn her loss, two sons, Frank Messmore and Alfred Mitchell, and one daughter, Mrs. H. S. Connor, besides numerous other relatives.

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Mrs. Emma Patchett Heacock, daughter of David and Elizabeth Patchett, was born in Bloomfield, Oakland County, December 17, 1850, and went to be with Christ, February 23, 1916, from her home in Birmingham.
