Mexican Revolt

Villa is flying northwest toward the foothills of the Sierra. According to reports received at Columbus, N. M., the expedition is likely to precipitate the American pursuit. All arms of the service are being used in an attempt to force the bands into a corner.

Threatened complications in the Mexican situation, disappearance of Washington when the Senate Republicans decided to accept the administration's assurances that judgment troops were on their way, and not to carry the agitation for more troops further at this time.

Eliaz Miliu, the Villa lieutenant shot through the head in the raid on Columbus, N. M., March 9, died at Dumas, N. M., March 20, from wounds. The surviving wounded prisoners are expected to recover.

A telegram from San Antonio, Tex., from Mexico City made public by the Mexican consulate states that the governor of Sonora has issued an order expelling all Germans.

Villa has escaped from the Mexican troops that had checked him near Naniquipa, and three columns of American cavalry are pursuing him. Villa defeated the Carranza troops already they are almost 250 miles south of the border. Villa's success was related in a detailed report by General Ferrel that reached General Funston at San Antonio, Tex.

Air scouts are proving invaluable to the American expeditionary force in Mexico, according to Lieut. T. S. Bowen, who reached Columbus, N. M. He has been invalided to San Antonio as the result of a fall.

Janos, 40 miles northwest of Casas Grandes, Mex., and on the route taken by the American expeditionary force was set on fire presumably by a band of Mexican bandits. Four large fires were reported by Americans.

Three Americans, two women and one man, were killed near Jilpano's ranch on the New Mexico-Mexico boundary, eight miles east of Columbus, N. M., presumably by Mexicans.

Lieut. Edgar S. Correll of the United States army corps who has been missing since last Sunday, was found three miles south of Ascension by a motor-truck train, according to reports from the Carranza expedition at Columbus, N. M. Lieutenant Correll was uninjured.

Juan Sanchez and Pablo Sanchez, two of the Mexicans arrested after Villa's raid on Columbus, were held at Dumas, N. M., without bail for the grand jury on a charge of murder.

American citizenship was denied to Takao Ozawa, a Japanese, in a test case at Honolulu, H. I. The court ruled that Japanese law had granted that the word "white" does not include the Mongolian race. Judge Charles F. Gleason of the United States district court denied Ozawa citizenship papers.

Chicago faces a milk famine beginning April 1. A strike has been called for that date by the Milk Producers' association, which takes in the territory of northern Illinois and Indiana and southern Wisconsin. A raise from 10c to 13.5c per hundredweight is demanded.

Gen. Harrison Gray Otis' editor of the Los Angeles Times, continues to improve in his fight against pneumonia. He passed a good night without the aid of stimulants.

Six persons were drowned when a gasoline launch was run down and sunk by the Standard Oil tank steamer Colianna near San Francisco.

In the presence of Miss Grace Hoffman, a high school student, Hardy Robinson, twenty-four, shot and killed Allan Phillips, seventeen, a rival for the girl's favor, at Miss Hoffman's home in Lexington, Ind.

Gov. George W. Cochran, governor of the Panama Canal zone, was recalled from New York for Panama on the steamship Pastora. He said he was confident that the canal would be opened on April 15, as had been the expectation.

President Wilson ordered Secretary of War Woodrow Wilson to press for New York to approve the release of Arthur Warren Woodward in connection with the death of John E. Reek, a millionaire druggist of Grand Rapids, Mich., who died in a condition of stupor as a result of an opiate self-administered.

Paul V. Hadley and his bride, who are alleged to have killed Sheriff Jacob Ellis of Beaman, Tex., on a Missouri-Kansas & Texas passenger train at Checotah, Okla., were captured near there.

Senator Sherman of Illinois introduced a resolution for the President to call for 50,000 volunteers for Mexican service. He declared the present number of volunteers for Mexico was no prospect of such action at this time.

The senate at Washington passed an urgent deficiency bill, carrying appropriations of approximately \$1,600,000. Nearly a million dollars were provided for maintenance and ordnance stores for the navy.

National Guard

The national guard of the states, or the organized militia, are permanent military organizations under laws of the United States and the respective states.

Michigan's Quota

The National Guard of Michigan is tentatively assigned to the Eleventh division. Its quota is one infantry brigade, one division of artillery and two squadrons of cavalry.

Appropriations and Cost

The National Guard of Michigan cost the United States government \$1,600,000 for the period were about \$164,000. A company costs the state about \$2,000.

New Organizations

The shortage of organizations can be overcome by a proper increase in the state military fund, and the approval of the United States authorities. The United States authorities will not recognize any new military organizations until the state has organized the needed artillery and cavalry. All items of increasing preparation.
