Endicott, With Sweeney Special, Will Attempt to Set New Record in Auto Racing, in Detroit, May 30.

"Farmer Bill" Endicott will make another attempt to set a new world's 100-mile record for a mile dirt track on the Decoration Day in connection with the two-day auto race meet at the Michigan State Fair Grounds, in Detroit, May 28 and May 30.

Endicott will attempt to set this record and incidentally cut in on a big slice of the \$10,000 in cash offered the drivers for the two days of racing, May 28 and 30.

Back in 1910, Endicott started the racing world by his winnings and then turned round and purchased a farm near Crawfordville, Indiana, and was dubbed "Farmer Bill" by the race drivers.

Among the prominent drivers named for the meeting in Detroit are: Endicott, Johnny Rainey, Eddie Hevner, Ed Conary, "Judy" Kippner, Bill LeCoca, John Mais, Irwin Hoffman, George Clark, Fred Woodberry, Fred Horey, and Dwight Kessler.

Council Proceedings

Regular adjourned meeting of the Village Council, May 15, 1916.

President, Philip Schlaack; Clerk, Thomas E. Harris. Trustees present: Brown, Trumbull, Jones, Harris, Daines.

Trustees absent: Parks. Jones moved, Harris seconded, that the petition of John Hanna, H. R. Garth, and C. J. Spain, for the widening of the pavement be proposed, on Pierce Street, from 20 feet to 36 feet, be accepted.

Yeas—5; nays—0; motion carried. Jones moved, Trumbull seconded, that the petition for pavement on Pierce Street be altered so as to conform with the petition of John Hanna and others.

Yeas—Daines, Trumbull, Jones, Harris, Brown, Nays—None. Motion carried. Brown moved, Jones seconded, sidewalk be laid on Woodward avenue, front of Car House property and charge of U. R. in accordance with their written instructions, dated June 23, 1915.

Yeas—5; nays—0; motion carried. Brown moved, Jones seconded, that the village proceed with the construction of storm sewers according to plans and specifications of engineer on Elm Street, from Haynes to Forest; on Martin Street, from schoolhouse to Pierce; on Pierce Street, from Martin to Brown; on Greenwood Avenue, from Willis to Harmon; on Chester Street, from Brown to Townsend.

Yeas—5; nays—0; motion carried. Brown moved, Jones seconded, that we ask for the time of meeting of the Village Council for hearing objections to the paving and sewer assessment, from May 15 to May 22, 1916.

Yeas—4; nays—0; motion carried. Harris moved, Trumbull seconded, that permission be given Charles E. Jones to move the old Nxm building on Woodward Avenue to his property on Pierce Street.

Yeas—4; nays—0; motion carried. Moved by Daines and supported by Trumbull that the following resolution be adopted and accepted.

Whereas, It was heretofore determined by this council that the paving on the easterly side of Woodward Avenue in said village and in front of lots 1 and 23 both inclusive of the graveling and grading said portion of said street, and

Whereas, It has been agreed by and between this council and Charles E. Jones, the owner of said lands, that the sum of seven hundred dollars be credited upon the amount of the assessment for paving against said premises, and that the balance of said assessment aggregating eighteen hundred twenty-three, and sixty-three one hundredths dollars be paid in four annual installments beginning at the date of the completion of said pavement in front of said premises, and

Whereas, The clerk has presented to this council said proposed agreement, and

Whereas, Said agreement has been approved by the village attorney as of fact, and

Whereas, Said agreement meets the approval of this council as to terms. Be it therefore

Resolved, That said agreement be executed in duplicate by Charles E. Jones, his wife, and

That the president and clerk of this village are hereby authorized and directed to execute said agreement on behalf of the village and that one copy thereof be delivered to said Charles E. Jones and the other copy filed in the office of the village clerk, and that upon the execution of said agreement as aforesaid, that the village council proceed with due and proper diligence to lay and construct said pavement in front of said premises in accordance with the plans and specifications heretofore adopted by this council for said improvement.

Resolved, That all resolutions heretofore adopted by this council in any way contravening the provisions heretofore made and the same are hereby rescinded and annulled.

Yeas—Daines, Brown, Trumbull, Harris, Nays—0. Motion carried. Brown moved, Harris supported, that we adjourn till Tuesday, May 16, 1916.
