 Scurrilous attacks, mud slinging, and such despicable methods have not been known in the country since the Civil War. Nothing is ever gained by such last-hour, underhanded, unwarranted methods. Nor will they avail now. The people have no sympathy with a man who will resort to such ends for his own political gain. Seldom do we witness such spectacles in this country. The past week has proved an exception. Judge K. P. Rockwell and Glenn C. Gillespie were made the objects of an attack in a circular sent out broadcast over the county. The fallacy of the article and the animosity behind the author is well set forth in a reply from Judge Rockwell in this issue.
