BLOOMFIELD IN HISTORIC PAGEANT.

On Thursday, Aug. 24, more than 20,000 people from all over the county, witnessed in Pontiac the most picturesque of the entire week of celebration of Oakland County's Centennial.

This was historical day and every township in the county was represented by a float typical of pioneer life of the early settlers. Ancient clothes, furniture and bygone relics were in evidence everywhere and it was a surprise to everyone that Oakland county possessed such a museum of articles of historic interest. But the parade, a mile in length, moved with such rapidity, that it was impossible to see all the details of each float.

Bloomfield's float, the interior of a log cabin of 1819, whose the township was settled, was conspicuous for its unique design, and it was undoubtedly the most complete of any in the parade. The furnishings were all near a half a century old, and consisted of a four poster solid black walnut bed, a trundle bed and very old patch work quilts, spinning wheel, wax waxel, chairs, andirons, candles, candle molds, ancient kettle, etc. From the rafters hung the much used herbs in the early day, also dried apples, and corn.

This scene would not have been complete without the Misses Elizabeth Floyd and Helen Sully, who in pioneer costume were busy knitting and spinning. Messrs. Ralph Coyle and Spencer Withey were also in pioneer costume and with the old musket were busy "keeping the wolf from the door." Donald Plumstead and Russell McGory were the "real barport boys" of the early days, and on horse back, "Great credit is due Miss Sarah McGory, chairman of the township committee, and the float committee for the splendid showing which Bloomfield made in the Pageant.
