### ANOTHER GOLF COURSE.

Another golf course will be open to Detroiters next season. The proposed site is part of the Oakland Hills Country Club and located two miles west of Birmingham on Maple Avenue. Maple will be made into a cement road next spring and by the time it is opened to traffic, the course should be completed.

It is owned and secured by the club's owners, 175 acres. It is composed of the Miller and Spicer farms. The course will be 18 holes, which leaves about 50 acres for other purposes. The plans are to add tennis courts, riding paths, and a club house. The land is ideal for a golf links. It is natural rolling but not as rolling as the Bloomfield Hills course.
