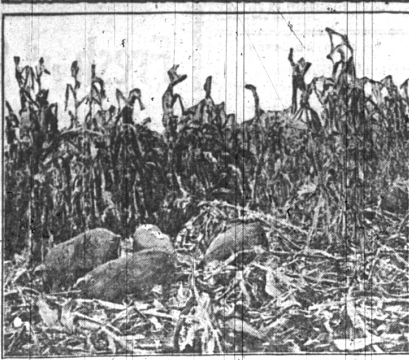

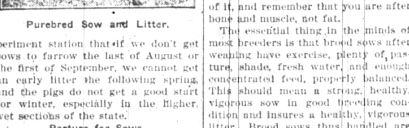
HANDLING SOWS AFTER WEANING LITTER



PROFITABLE METHOD FOR HARVESTING CORN.

By C. W. HICKMAN, Animal Husbandry Department, Idaho Experiment Station. The management of the brood sow after weaning her litter is a matter of considerable importance. There are a number of factors that will cause the summer management to vary. Among the most important factors are the age and condition of the sow and the number of litters—one or two raised per year.

If it is a mature sow and you plan to raise a full litter, you probably have fed her well, and if so the sow should begin to gain in flesh when the litter is from eight to ten weeks old and in most cases the sow will come in heat then so you can breed her for only full pigs. We find at the ex-



periment station that if we don't get sows to farrow the last of August or the first of September, we cannot get an early litter the following spring, and the pigs do not get a good start for winter, especially in the highest wet sections of the state.

Pasture for Sows. Brood sows should have a large rooney pasture which will afford plenty of exercise and succulent feed, both of which are indispensable for strong, healthy litters. In addition to their pasture, their feed should consist of oats, shorts, and barley or which are usually some tankage. As to the

INFLAMED UDDERS DISTURBING FACTOR Infectious Garget Is Usually Not Easily Cured—Disease Spread by Milkers. Garget makes an appearance every once in a while in cows which apparently are in perfect health. The milk in severe cases is either stringy or otherwise altered in character when drawn and collects a yellowish colored sediment on standing. In less pronounced cases there may be little visible change in the milk, but an examination will reveal a large number of germs.

Noninfectious garget is caused by bruises or other injuries, or by a sudden change of food. Furthermore, it is frequently occurs in heavy milking and in heifers at first calving. Affected animals usually make a complete recovery if the udder is kept clean and their feed is restricted to that of a succulent nature.

EVERY POULTRYMAN MUST FIGHT MITES When Allowed to Multiply They Spread to All Parts of House—Use Whitewash. Every poultry keeper must fight mites. They are carried by sparrows and in various other ways.

Substitute for Red Clover. While sweet clover can be grown as a substitute for red clover and generally furnishes more feed per acre, the most valuable use of the legume is for green manuring.

Cull Unprofitable Ewes. Patten unprofitable ewes now, during the warm weather, and put the ewe lambs in their places.

Substitute for Manure. When short of manure fertilize with the teeth of the harrow a little more.

IRON POSTS SUPPORT WIRE

German Idea That Makes Their Trenches Only a Little Way From Being Impregnable.

In the Atlantic Monthly Mr. Edward Morley describes a very clever improvement the Germans have made in their barbed-wire defenses. The steel posts are usually fastened to wooden posts, of course, but the Germans have found a better support for them. He writes: "I had taken the German trench, our men set to work to remodel it, building the parapet to the other side, shifting little outpost trenches and the like. I had a wire job was done in a wonderfully short time, thanks to German thoroughness. For the wooden stakes to which the wire was attached I had substituted soft iron rods, three-quarters of an inch thick, twisted five times in the shape of a great corker. This screw twisted into the ground fastened like a cork puller into a cork. The straight part of the rod, being twisted upon itself down and up again every ten inches, formed a series of sharp points, and a height of about five feet. Into these holes the barbed wire was laid and solidly secured with short lengths of wire."

The car fell 14 feet and landed upside down. Milgram, who was a local druggist, was killed outright. Mr. and Mrs. Stark died half an hour later and Eschbach an hour after he had been taken from the wreckage to Providence hospital.

TWENTY-NINE WERE KILLED And 1548 Were Injured According to Report of the Industrial Board.

Lansing—Compensation claims reported to the industrial accident board in August totaled 1,275, of which 2,000 were fatal and 1,248 resulted in permanent disability. The total amount of compensation paid was \$195,041.17.

Washington—Major-General Gashell, governor of the canal zone, reports a quake at Guacacema, just south of Gold Hill. The movement generated the charged air which did not last long.

Saville—By wireless to Saville—No limit has been placed on the amount of the subscription for the new bridge over the river. The bridge will be opened. Installments will be due October 18, November 24, January 8 and February 8.

New York—The number of new cases of infantile paralysis reported showed another increase. But officials of the health department retain their faith of certainty that the epidemic is in the wane.

Paris—Competent authorities estimate that about 400,000 Germans have been disabled in the Verdun region since February 21, the beginning of the great German offensive. The total number of wounded German prisoners taken in the Verdun sector and in the neighborhood of the same exceeds 42,000.
