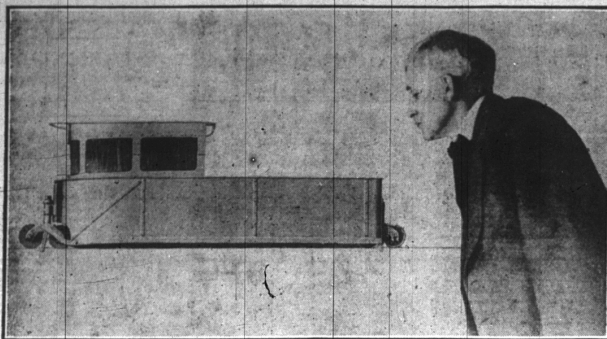


Coming Here Chautauqua Week

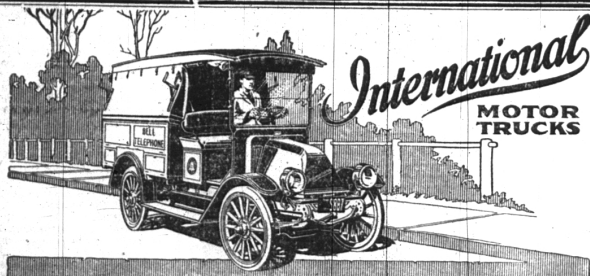
