**RED CROSS NEWS.**

The recent draft of the large army of men from our community has emphasized strongly the seriousness of the war situation, and it is a forcible reminder of the great need of a constant stream of hospital supplies if we are going to meet the needs of our soldiers and sailors.

Work at Red Cross headquarters continues unabated and with screens in all the windows the work room is very comfortable. The attendance on Monday evening is very good, but the committees would be glad to have more helpers Tuesday morning, Thursday and Saturday afternoons.

During the week of July 23, 14 dozen comfort bags of flannel were cut, made and sent to Newberry House, Detroit, for Dr. Shurley's base hospital.

The work at present is surgical dressings of all kinds, muslin to be made into different kinds of bandages, gray wool for knitted socks, and white cotton for knitted waste cloths which are needed in quantities.

There is plenty of material on hand for work either at headquarters, or to be taken home, and any one wishing information in regard to it is asked to telephone Mrs. George R. Ferguson.

Will the churches and lodges kindly bring the attention of their members to the need for more Red Cross workers?

If you are ready "to do your bit" there is plenty of work waiting to be done and a competent instructor always to show you how it should be done.

The public are again reminded that the American Red Cross is the only organization authorized by the government to give relief to "our boys" when sick or wounded over seas.

This is the opportunity for service for the "army at home." The delay in receiving the Red Cross Magazine is due to the pressure of work at Washington, but the magazine will be sent to the subscribers as soon as it is possible.

**WANTED BOOKS FOR THE SOLDIERS.**

The inactive hours for which Satan is supposed to have a special predilection are going to come to camp and field when our boys are mobilized. The depressing tedium and dangerous temptation of these hours might be filled by mentally restorative reading, and this is an opportunity for service the American Library Association has already seen to be taking. A committee on War-Service for Libraries, under its auspices, was formed at the annual conference of the A. L. A. at Louisville, Ky., in June. This committee, through its chairman Dr. Herbert Putnam, Librarian of Congress, sees an extraordinary opportunity for a service which is especially appropriate of permanent benefit.

This question, whether the association can undertake the task, is being answered by the permanent "War-Service" Committee, as we learn from its frequent plans for the expenditure of some half-million dollars in libraries at the sixteen main cantonments of the new National Army, as well as at other camps throughout the country. Close cooperation is expected with the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the Red Cross, and other organizations that may have included within their plans the distribution and use of reading matter. We quote from the Committee's bulletins as follows:

"This Committee is meeting daily, and its first aim has been to perfect a scheme of organization that will assemble and co-ordinate various efforts exerted through libraries and through expert service in connection with books. The Association is anxious to help all to compete with none and the committee believes that this aim can best be accomplished by seeing that those who are willing to help pull together in one direction instead of against one another is diffused widely."

"In preparation for these various forms of service have been assigned to individual members of the committee with power to associate others with themselves, thus constituting auxiliary committees. Upon the recommendation of these, the actual activity of the main committee will be organized."
