THE NEW SERVICE AT THE TABERNACLE NEW SECRETARY BEST RECORD YET

New Express Service Between Detroit and Pontiac Begins on Monday, January 22.

The new express service between Detroit and Pontiac, in which the trailer, and will make only these stops between Detroit and Birmingham: Log Cabin, 7-mile road, 8 miles road, 9-mile road, 10-mile road, Hudson Avenue, Royal Oak; Waiting Room; Royal Oak; Maple Street; Royal Oak; Black Meadow; 12-mile road; Parker's Corner, 15-mile road, Lincoln Avenue, Birmingham; Frank Street, Birmingham; Waiting Room; Birmingham; Car House, Birmingham; all stops north of Birmingham.

From Birmingham south there will be local cars at 4:55 a. m., 5:20 a. m., 6:05 a. m., and every half-hour to 6:35 p. m. This with other service giving a 15-minute service from 5:50 a. m. to 6:50 p. m., with half-hourly service thereafter to 10:30 p. m., then 11:30 p. m.

Southbound, the first express car will leave Pontiac at 5:30 a. m., Birmingham at 5:50 a. m., Royal Oak at 6:04 a. m., reaching Detroit Waiting Room at 6:58 a. m. Express service thereafter will be half-hourly to and from Detroit 6:20 p. m., after which half-hourly local service will be given from 6:30 p. m. to 10:20 p. m. and then 11:30 p. m., and 12:30 a. m. for Birmingham only.

Northbound express cars will have intermediate station, Detroit, at 6:05 a. m., Royal Oak at 7 a. m., Birmingham at 7:12 a. m., arriving in Pontiac at 7:43 a. m. Express service thereafter will be every half hour to 7:35 p. m. There will be half-hourly through service from 8:05 p. m. to 11:35 p. m., and 12:05 a. m. local for Birmingham only.

In the morning, there will be a local service from Birmingham to Pontiac at 5:40 a. m., 6:10 a. m., and 6:40 a. m.

In addition to the service mentioned, there will be local cars out of Detroit to Birmingham only starting at 6:20 a. m., and half-hourly to 7:50 p. m. This trip will be every 15 minutes out of Detroit for Royal Oak and Birmingham from 6:05 a. m. to 8:05 p. m., and half-hourly service from then until 12:05 a. m.

The motor cars and trailers making this train will operate on pay meter cars in the city limits. On the trailer, the entrance and exit is at the front end of the car. There will be a smoking compartment on the front car only of the express train.
