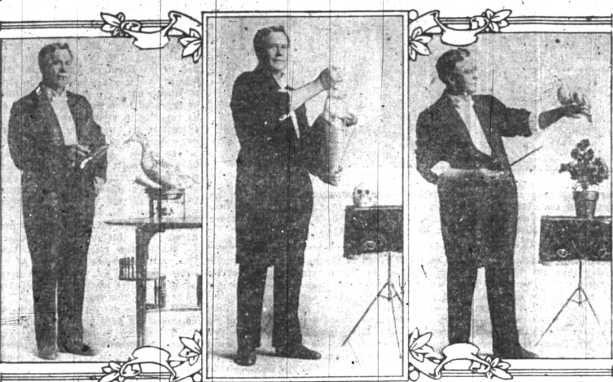

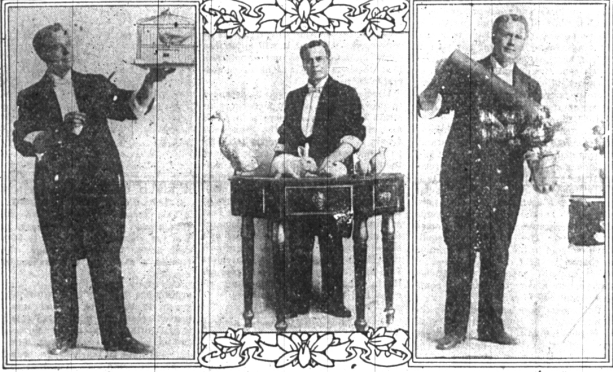

HOMES ASKED FOR

The Children's Aid Society of Detroit, Are Looking for Good Homes for Neglected Children.

The need of volunteers who will offer their homes to neglected little children was strongly emphasized as one of the best ways to meet the National emergency, by Eugene W. Lewis, president of the Children's Aid Society, at the regular monthly meeting of the directors of the society last held. Speaking of the plans of the society, Mr. Lewis said:

"The Children's Aid Society stands ready, as was the Home for the aged, less in the days of the Civil War, to aid and protect children made orphans or homeless by this great European conflict. The society, as the successor of the older institution, is doing the same service according to the best methods of child care and protection. What we want now is to immediately learn of good people in Detroit and the surrounding districts who will help little children. In every town there are people who want to 'do their bit.' Some can best do one thing and others another. There are many homes of comparative comfort where a pestilent little child can be loved and cared for; where to provide such a little waif with food and motherly care, is just the finest thing that particular home can do in this crisis.

Such volunteers are now needed. What finer thing can be done at this time than to offer a home freely to one or two little kiddies who have lost their home or whose fathers have died or gone to war? In most cases these children are from 3 to 12 years of age and cannot be placed for adoption at present. We urgently desire to know of such homes. Anyone who feels they can help this great work by caring for little future citizens, now homeless, is urged to communicate with the Children's Aid Society, 33 West Warren Street, Detroit, Michigan.

We need fifty fine, free homes right now. We are hoping by this statement to learn of many exceptionally good homes from people who have not thought to come forward. Our first duty to our country is to conserve its child life."

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Birmingham School District, will be held in the high school building, Monday evening, June 9. The Board of Education will present at this meeting a report concerning the Baldwin High School now nearing completion, and is much pleased with the showing that will be made.

The contracts for its construction let over a year ago amounted to \$179,000, and the sum was raised by a bond issue at that time. The extras on the various contracts will probably be less than \$1,000. The question of the method of providing for the payment for equipment, supervision and architects' fees will be brought up at the annual meeting. \$9,000 toward these expenses has already been realized from the Martha Baldwin Estate, and it is estimated that the estate will yield \$15,000 more from land contracts in Detroit, and from the real estate on Bonny Brier Avenue and the Park, within a reasonable time if the sale is not forced.

The amount necessary to pay for the architects' fees, equipment, etc., is about \$30,000, which, less the \$9,000 on hand, leaves about \$21,000 to be provided for at the present time, either by direct tax or by a short time bond issue, which later would in large part be retired by income from the Baldwin Estate. It is estimated that if the contracts for the Baldwin school were to be let at the present time, the building would cost \$85,000 over the present contract price. Hence the Board of Education is pleased that the cost has been kept within such reasonable bounds.

AT COUNTY COURT

Prisoners from the Jail at Work on Roads; Gambling Den Raided Last Sunday Night.

Thirty-two prisoners from the County jail are now working upon the county roads. A camp is located in the northern part of the county near Lakeville, and another gang is doing work on Woodward Avenue. Owing to the fact that two of the prisoners took "French leave," from the Lakeville camp last week, Sheriff Green has placed three Deputies in charge instead of two.

As a result of a raid on a gambling place at 67 1/2 South Saginaw Street last Sunday night, eight Turks were heavily fined by Justice Stockwell Monday. The result of the fines increased the Treasury of Oakland county by \$400. The local officers are conducting a vigorous campaign against all forms of gambling in the city of Pontiac and more arrests may be expected within a few days.

P. G. Gibbons, of Windsor, who is accused of having stolen 1,800 feet of lumber belonging to Clinton Pulver, in Addison township, was bound over for trial to the Circuit Court. It is claimed that he drove a large automobile truck from Detroit, loaded the lumber, and later sold it to a Detroit dealer for \$80. Prosecuting Attorney, Glenn C. Gillispie is preparing the Prosecutor's semi-annual report to the Attorney General, for the first month of the year 1917. The tabulation of the report is promised for next week."
