AT COUNTY COURT

Many Cases Tried at Pontiac Last Week. Criminal Court Will be Busy For Next Two Weeks.

Thirteen arraignments were made in the Circuit Court at the June term, William J. Murray of Birmingham pleaded not guilty to a charge of blackmail. Roy Robinson was not present to answer to a charge of assault and battery, he having been sentenced to serve 90 days in the Detroit House of Correction, while his case was pending in the Circuit Court. Charles Konecker, charged with operating his automobile without dimming his head-lights upon meeting vehicles, was not present in court and his bail of \$50.00 was forfeited. Walter J. Runnett of Holly pleaded not guilty to a charge of rape. F. O. St. Dennis of Richmond, Michigan, pleaded not guilty to a charge of embezzlement. Charles Pollen pleaded not guilty to a charge of assault and battery, appealed from the Justice Court. L. F. Swines pleaded not guilty to a charge of violating local option law. Sentence was deferred in his case until June 11. Gilbert Grosjean of Pontiac pleaded not guilty to a serious offense. It is expected that the criminal work will occupy the attention of the Circuit Court for the next two weeks.

Prosecutor Gillespie has filed a bill in Circuit Court for County of Oakland in Chancery under a law passed by the 1917 Legislature asking for an injunction to compel the proprietors and owners of two houses in Pontiac where intoxicating liquors were sold in violation of the Local Option law to close their place of business for one year. The officers announce that in all cases hereafter where there are convictions under the Local Option law that they will proceed under the new State law, to compel owners of the buildings to close the same for a period of one year.

A PAIGE "SIX-51"

Does 30 Miles in 22 Minutes and 4 Seconds. Stock Car Makes Fine Showing on May 31.

Bowling along at a steady, unvarying speed of 30 miles an hour, a Paige car, "six-51" stock chassis, covered 30 miles in 22 minutes and four seconds in the Cincinnati races-Memorial Day and thus scored a distinct achievement that its sponsors regard as significant.

The event was the 30-mile invitation race open to stock cars, there being no restrictions as to motor size. The regular Paige "51" model chassis was used. There was no enlargement of the motor, no enlargement of the valves and the crankshaft and camshaft were the same as employed in all "51" models.

The gear ratio on the rear axle was changed for greater speed, which is an alteration that can easily be made for any purchaser and therefore not a vital departure from the regular stock model. The only other changes were of a similar nature, such as the addition of a magneto for ignition, additional oiling facilities and the tightening of the piston and connecting rods.

The Paige did not stop at the pit at any time, and in a field of four of the best known cars finished second. In view of the conditions that prevailed and the open nature of the race, the Paige officials are vastly proud of the showing of their car.

"Dorr's rebellion was raised many years ago by Thomas W. Dorr, a lawyer of Providence, R. I. An early constitution of Rhode Island afforded property qualification to the right of suffrage. In 1841, Dorr was elected governor on a free suffrage platform and attempted to seize the state government by force. The attempt ended in his flight, his subsequent arrest and trial and conviction for treason. He was sentenced to imprisonment for life, but after a few years' imprisonment was pardoned in 1847. He lived to see Rhode Island with a more liberal constitution than the one he had fought against and died in 1852.
