D. 1917, an application was filed with James Butler, County Drain Commissioner of the County of Oakland, for the opening, deepening and tilting of a certain drain, which said drain was described in said application as follows: "The drain, the northwest corner of and three (3) feet of the Township of Royal Oak, thence running east, following the course of the Wilson Drain, a distance of about 100 rods, and to be a sewer pipe drain not to exceed 18 inches in diameter; that said drain will traverse the Township of Royal Oak. Now, therefore, it is further ordered that by virtue of the power vested in me by the Statute in that behalf provided, I do hereby designate that on the 3d day of July, A.
