Splendid Program to be Given at Royal Oak High School, Friday Evening, April 6.

The Oakland County Y. M. C. A. will hold a banquet for men and boys at the Royal Oak High School, Friday, April 6, at 7:30 Eastern time. A splendid program has been arranged, consisting of addresses by James Schmeherhorn, editor of the Detroit Times, one of the State Secretaries, and a number of local boys. Thad E. Leland, of Birmingham, will act as toastmaster. The banquet will be served by the Ladies' Aid of the Baptist Church.

Men and boys who wish to attend are urged to buy their tickets early, as only a limited number will be sold, and the ladies wish to know how many to prepare for. The leaders and committee men in the different towns will sell the tickets. The price will be 50 cents.

The banquet will begin promptly at 7:30 Eastern time, and the program will not be long, so those who have far to go may get home early. Fathers bring your sons; sons bring your fathers.

The ministers and other leading men of Royal Oak, are planning to perfect joint organization of the county Y. M. C. A. work immediately after the banquet.
