Limit on Incomes Reduced to \$1,000 for Single Men and \$2,000 for Married Men—Taxes for Heirs Acre Increased—Tariff Raised 10 Per Cent on Articles on Free List Are Taxed 10 Per Cent.

Washington—A war revenue bill designed to raise \$1,800,000,000 by taxation during the coming year was approved finally in the house ways and means committee Tuesday by unanimous vote and reported to the house Wednesday.

INCOME AND PROFITS

Most of the new revenue will come from the income, excess profits, and inheritance taxes and additional tariff duties, but the levies of the bill would reach into many other sources.

HOW INCOME TAX WORKS OUT

CALLS QUESTION PREMATURE

Chancellor is Bitterly Attacked by Socialist Leader Who Threatens Revolution in Germany.

Berlin—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, imperial chancellor, refused in the reichstag today to outline the terms of peace. Instead, he offered peace to Russia. The only condition, he said, was enunciation by Russia of her aims in a conquest.

NEWS REVIEW OF THE PAST WEEK

MAKES ENTIRE NATION HELP

RUSSIAN SITUATION HOPEFUL

Petrograd, via London—The executive committee of the Council of Workers and Soldiers' Delegates today discussing the internal situation in Russia, decided by 41 votes against 19 to favor the participation of representatives of the radical parties in the provisional government.

SEVEN U-BOATS CAPTURED

Reported to Have Been on Way to U. S. When Taken by English.

An American Port—A fleet of at least seven German submarines had been sunk or captured by the British while on their way to United States waters, according to information received by the submarine war on their way into the Atlantic when overhauled by British submarines.

ENORMOUS OUTLAY FOR WAR

British Chancellor of the Exchequer Gives Facts When Introducing Measure for New Credit.

London—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, in the commons discussed most of the main features of the war. Some of them, he said, could be viewed with great satisfaction by the British. Others were of most disturbing nature.

DESPERATE STRUGGLE IN PRUSSIA

The desperate battle for possession of the coal fields of Lusatia in northern Prussia continued unabated through the week. Crown Prince Rupprecht of Prussia, with great masses of reserve troops and air squadrons, to check the advancing British attack, and on Tuesday he succeeded in re-taking the Lusatia coal fields. That night and the next day the British returned to the assault and again took possession of most of the lost ground.

STAND OF AMERICAN SOCIALISTS

Leading American socialists gave out a statement denouncing the international conference in Stockholm, Sweden, which was held in Stockholm in June as the most dangerous of all the Kaiser's plots for small losses, comparatively suffered by the British in the Arras offensive.

DEALER ALWAYS HAD MORE THAN HE NEEDED

With the coming of the war the heavy importation of goods had ceased entirely, and those from England had fallen to very small proportions. Meanwhile, the American manufacturers have endeavored to increase their capacity sufficiently to meet the heavy demand which they also must satisfy.
