## **GREAT BOTANIST**

Samuel Alexander, Aged 86 Years Dies at His Home in Detroit. Was Well Known Here.

The funeral of Samuel Alexander, the first student of the Michigan Agricultural College to could in the Civil War, and an authority on botany, with a continental reputation; who died hast Tuesday night, toke place Thursday afternoon. Services were held in his late residence, 984 Hudson Avenue, at 2 o'clock, interment being in Woodmere Camesters.

Mr. Alexander was born in Ohio in 1840, and came to Michigan when 14 years old. He was attodent at the Agricultural College when the Civil War broke out, and immediately volunteered his service. His first important work was the carrying of messages from the Military Commander at Lansing, to Governor Blair, who was then in Detroit. On that trip he met his future wife, who is hale and hearty though 86 years old.

Because of his marked knowledge of wooderaft, and familiarly with the natural sciences, he was transferred to the topographical department of the army. 
