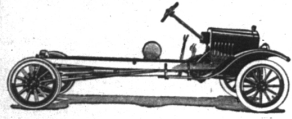

Sheriff Chas. Cross and family of Pontiac and several others were callers at the L. J. Bellis home Sunday p. m.

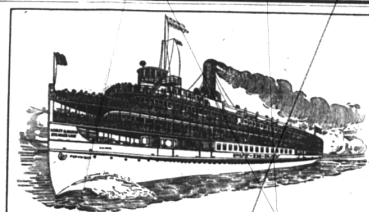
Vernon Leonard had a birthday party August 17. His father Frank Leonard celebrated his own natal day August 19.
