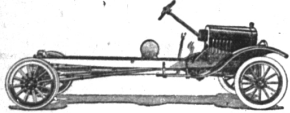

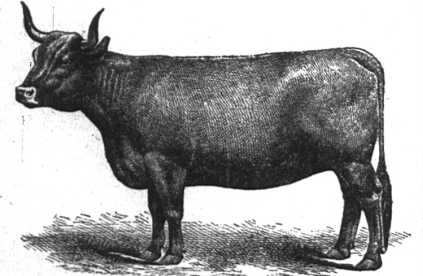

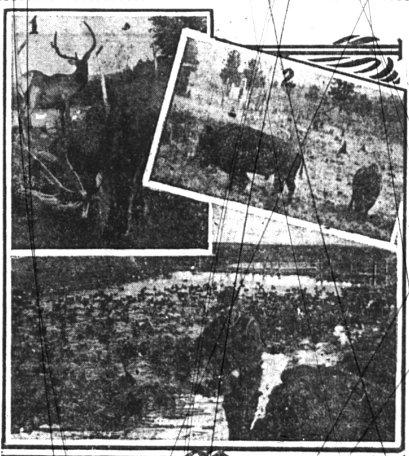

"WILD LIFE OF MICHIGAN" AT STATE FAIR

State Preparing Exhibit Which Will Include Every Animal, Bird and Fish Which Ever Roamed The Forests, Flew In The Air or Swam In The Streams of Michigan.



No 1-bird grazing on the Hudson game refuge. No 2—"Wahhalls" the first perfect American bull born here in Michigan in over 1,000 years. No 3—Breeding wild waterfowl at a state game preserve. These animals and fowls will be a part of the Michigan Wild Life Display at the Michigan State Fair.
Wild Life of Michigan, including all the indigenous birds, fish, and mammals supplemented by a complete presentation of the migratory waterfowl which traverses the Great Lakes area in the spring and fall. It will be shown at the Michigan State Fair in Detroit, August 30—September 1. The exhibit, which becomes this year for the first time an adjunct of the Fair through the courtesy of the commissions, will be under the direction of John Baird, State Game Commissioner, Marcell Schmitt, State Forester, and Seymour Bowser, chief of Fish Culture and Hatcheries.
In mammals, the past year's prairie moose which passed the winter in Michigan during winter and in the Indians, has been rescued from well preserved remains found in Wayne and Oakland Counties and the bones of the first A. P. Followell, the first of American Buffalo, formerly a resident and again being bred in Michigan white-tail moose, black bear, weaver, deer, fisher, martin, hawk, muskrat, coon, otter, porcupine, and other species of the state will be shown.
Game and Food Fish.
Native and introduced species of game and food fish, resident in state waters will be presented in the Michigan Fish Commission's aquarium of twenty-nine tanks showing, in natural life, the New England, rainbow, brook, landlocked, "liberty" shiner,
