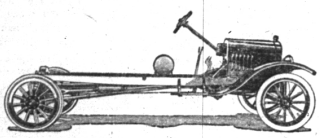

OAKLAND COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS ROLL OF HONOR.

Six hundred and ninety-eight Oakland County children attended the public schools of the county six months during the year ending June, 1918, without being absent or tardy, and all have been granted certificates of award by School Commissioner.
