Birmingham, Mich., Jan. 22, 1918.  
Mr. Wm. Lakin, Road Commissioner, Township of Troy, Mich.  
Dear Sir:  
The one mile of highway between the Village of Birmingham and the Township of Troy, as between all municipalities and Townships, should be divided so that the Village have one-half mile and the township the other one-half mile to take care of. You see the people facing this highway \$2 per thousand for road repair.

We think it is time you should put some of that money on the roads adjoining the property taxed and not expect Birmingham to do it all and you keep the money.  
You will please take notice that from now on, unless other arrangements are made, Birmingham will fare for the one-half mile of highway for the village Avenue south and Troy the other one-half mile from Maple Avenue north. Yours very truly,
