## PRESIDENT ISSUES W.S.S. PROCLAMATION

**THE PRESIDENT BRINGS SOME PERTINENT FACTS TO THE ATTENTION OF MICHIGAN PEOPLE.**  
**NATIONAL WAR SAVINGS DAY IS SET**  
 Michigan's Full Quota of \$70,000,000 Must Be Pledged by June 23—The Government's Thrift Plan is Explained.

(The Michigan War Savings Committee urges all citizens to read this proclamation to their congregations before June 23.)

**Message.**  
 "This war is one of nations, not of armies, and all of our one hundred million people must be economically and financially adjusted to war conditions. It is not to be played just for the fun of it. The problem is to win the war, not merely a financial proposition but rather a proposition of national survival. It is essential and the saving of the materials and the labor necessary for the support and equipment of our army and navy. Thoughtless expenditures of money for non-essentials uses up the labor of men, the products of the farms, mines and factories, and overburdens transportation, all of which must be used to the utmost, and at their best for war purposes.

The great results which we need can be obtained only by the participation of every member of our nation, young and old, in a national concerted effort. I must therefore urge that our people everywhere pledge themselves to the program of the Secretary of the Treasury to the purpose of raising the Government's full quota in increasing production in all fields necessary to the winning of the war to conserve food and fuel and useful materials of every kind to devote their labor to the most necessary tasks and to lay only those things which are essential to individual health and evidence of their loyalty invest all that they can save in Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps. The securities issued by the Treasury Department are among the most profitable of them within the reach of everyone. The door of opportunity in this matter is wide open to all of us. To practice thrift in peace times is a virtue and a great benefit to the individual at all times, with the desperate need of the civilized world today for materials and labor with which to end the war. The practice of individual thrift is a patriotic duty and all who own either Liberty Bonds or War Savings Stamps, should be proud to contribute to the national effort and to appeal to all who do not own such securities to purchase them and to purchase them to the extent of their means. The United States Government transfers the full value of the money to the United States Government until after the war, and to that same degree does not put in competition with the government.

"I earnestly appeal to every man, woman and child to pledge themselves on or before the twenty-eighth of June to save constantly and to buy as regularly as possible the securities of the government, month by month, in Liberty Bonds and this special period of settlement in the great volunteer drive. I am sure that you will know the reason why. And it will have to be an excellent reason.

## 55th ENGINEERS

Remarks Made on the Occasion of the Presentation of a Flag at Camp Custer.

Some weeks ago at one of the meetings of the Birmingham Unit, American Red Cross, Mrs. Thad Leland gave a talk on the work being accomplished at Camp Custer, and she especially called attention to the regiment of Fifty-fifth Engineers, nicknamed "The Snappy Fifty-fifts."

It was suggested that a flag be presented to this regiment, and a voluntary contribution quickly furnished the needed funds.

Colonel Edmund L. Daley, commanding officer of the Fifty-fifth Engineers, was notified of the action taken by Birmingham admirers, and he at once took the most careful steps to accept the hospitality of the regiment, to visit the camp on Friday, May 27th.

Thirty-six representatives of the delegation and left on the morning train, arriving at Battle Creek about noon on Saturday, May 28th. They were met by the delegation at the train, introducing them to Mrs. Fitzgerald, who welcomed them all in her gracious manner.

Automobiles speedily transported the visitors to the headquarters of the Fifty-fifth Engineers, where Colonel Daley and his charming wife offered the hospitality of the camp to their guests.

Dinner was served at the Officer's Mess, after which, preceded by the regiment of Fifty-fifth Engineers, the visitors marched to the drill grounds over a specially constructed road, made for the purpose of the day before by the engineers. Mrs. W. C. Harris, Chairman of the Birmingham Unit, presented the flag to Colonel Daley, in the following words:

"Colonel Daley and officers and men of the 55th Regiment of Engineers, the Birmingham Red Cross Unit has done me the honor to ask me to be the spokesman for the Birmingham Unit, and so I am standing before you, I must confess, in fear and trembling. You know we women are not used to the idea of standing back of our men, but when it comes to standing in front of them I assure you it is quite terrifying.

"That was what you know that it is a joy to be with you today. I feel that we can do a little something for you who are doing such a great something for us. We came with you over there, such as some of us would like to see you are giving us a little more spirit, and every time you look at this flag we want you to remember that we are loving you that we are something for you and praying for you, and also that our faith in your courage and fidelity is unbounded.

"I am sure that you will find it a great pleasure to present to you this flag in the name of the Birmingham Red Cross Unit.

Colonel Daley responded in these words:

"Mrs. Harris and members of the Birmingham Red Cross, I am sure for the officers and men of the Fifty-fifth Engineers, I thank you. I assure you that our appreciation is animated by every best impulse within us. We will ever continue to value this flag, not for its intrinsic value, but for the spirit which prompted the donors. That spirit is the expression of the soul of an American people.

In your gift of this siltken flag, you have testified again to the solidarity of Americans. There is no soldier in this regiment from your town. There are not a large proportion from your state. But they are all Americans. This regiment is not a local organization. You could not have been animated by local pride. What you have done, has been done by an American Regiment.

You represent an organization which knows no creed, no color, no race. Its beneficiary is humanity. The interests of humanity are at stake in this war. Those interests will be conserved when America wins this war.

America is winning this War. She is winning this war against a great military power, against the most terrible war machine ever conceived. The German Army is an efficient Army. But the American Army is an efficient Army. The American Army is winning and will win the war since the deciding weight in the balance is this indisputable fact—We are fighting a just fight."

We have heard so often that America can win this war if the whole nation becomes aroused. The nation is aroused! This war is not being fought only by those of us who wear our nation's uniform. It is being fought by the Red Cross, by the Y. M. C. A., by the K. C. by every denomination, and set in the wide land. Americans by birth and Americans by choice are fighting it. And Americans who are not yet citizens who are offering their all even unto life itself to win their Americanism in this war. Young men are fighting this war in our gardens, factories and homes. Women and children are fighting it in school and home. In their churches, sewing rooms and at their tables.

The Liberty Loans testify that America, all America is in this war. The Y. M. C. A. hats, the K. C. hats, the pulpits of churches, and every voice prove it; the willing sacrifices of our children and children in their homes demonstrate that every ounce of our glorious strength is being exerted to secure liberty for the peoples of the world.

Your action in bringing this flag here is, to us, a demonstration of the solidarity of the United States. It is an evidence of your faith in our Americanism. This regiment will prove your faith. We take it with us with high resolve to be worthy of your faith and worthy of its symbolism of liberty for all peoples. We take it firmly purposed to bring it back to you in honor or die gloriously with the benediction of its God-given inspiration.

For your flag, for your faith in us, and for your inspiration, the Fifty-fifth Engineers thank the Birmingham Red Cross. We will be worthy."

Following the presentation Company A secured the colors. Company B, commanded by Captain Jacobowski, secured the color company. This ceremony, Escort of the Colors, is the most formal and soul stirring ceremonial of the army, and as the band of music untuned in the misty air, the heart swelled with pride, and eyes dimmed as the stars were extinguished as the rain which began to fall soon after the ceremony, a

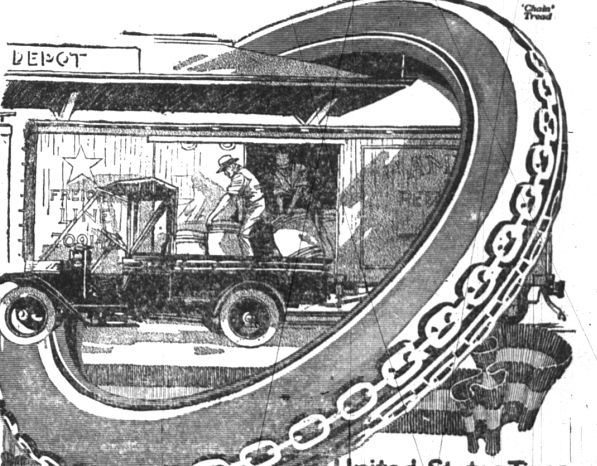
**DETROIT SCHOOL PUPIL WRITES CLEVER VERSES**
