A year later he took up a homestead in Detroit township, Brown county, and was one of the first to move with his family into this new part of the country. He came to Aberdeen in 1885, where he had made his home ever since. Mrs. Hedger died in December, 1910, and since that time Mr. Hedger had made his home with his son, Frank C. Hedger.

Mr. Hedger is survived by his son, three brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Samuel C. Hedger, Joseph B. Ripon, Cal. and B. H. Hedger of Chicago. Miss Abbie Hedger and Mrs. Rachael Lyons, both of South Lyon, Mich., are the sisters.

Mr. Hedger was a member of the Methodist church and was active in Masonic affairs, where he had been a member for more than fifty years. He was a member of the Odd Fellows of the Masonic temple at 3 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. The rites will be held at 7:30 p. m. at the residence of the deceased.

The remains will be laid to rest in the family lot in Riverside cemetery.
