Objects Get Non-Combatant Jobs. Washington—An executive order issued by President Wilson provides that all conscientious objectors to the selective draft shall be given non-combatant service. The non-combatant branches outlined by the president include the medical corps, quartermaster corps, and the engineer service. The order provides that as far as may be feasible, assignments of objectors will be restricted to the national guard and that the president is made free assignment to other branches.

# GERMANS USING AIR RESERVES

BRITISH CORRESPONDENT SAYS TEUTONS HAVE 3,000,000 MEN ON WEST FRONT.

BIG NEW GUNS BOMBARD PARIS. Hurt Shells Into French Capital at Regular Intervals From Point Nearly 75 Miles Away.

London—Telegraphing late Tuesday, the correspondent of the Daily Mail, chief headquarters in France, says that nearly two-thirds of the entire strategic reserve of the German army now has been thrown into the breach and vigorously continued attacks.

"This German reserve," he adds, "consisted of 85 divisions, totaling 1,270,000 men, out of a total number now reaching not far short of 200 divisions, or possibly 3,000,000 men, which they have on the western front."

"After the first day 21 of these divisions were put into the battle. The third day another 21 are known to have taken part. Since then they must have been on the reserve for a few more divisions."

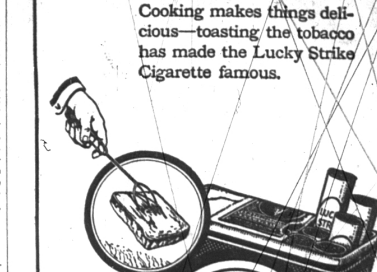
