

HOW TO GROW

GARDEN PEAS.

Early peas require a rather rich sandy loam with good drainage in order that the first plants may be made early in the spring. Fertilizers that are high in nitrogenous matter should not be applied to the land immediately before planting. ...

The first plantings should be of such varieties as Alaska, some of the modifications, which make a small but quick growth and may or may not be provided with supports. ...

Peas should be drilled in rows, one to two plants being sufficient for each foot row. The individual plants should be placed about 1 inch apart in the rows. ...

If peas are to be grown for immediate use only, a quart or more should be planted at one time. However, if it is desired to grow peas for canning, large plantings should be made. ...

Onions can be produced on almost any good garden soil, and consist of one of the standard crops found in almost every garden. ...

Onions may be planted as soon as the ground can be worked and before frosts are over. Some kinds may be planted in the autumn. ...

Onions require frequent shallow cultivation, and it may be necessary to resort to hand work in order to keep the crop free from weeds. ...

It is desirable to use the onions as green or bunch onions during the early part of the growing season, and to pull at any time after they are large enough, otherwise they should be allowed to grow until they reach maturity. ...

Muskmelons. A sandy loam with plenty of well-rotted manure incorporated in the soil was well adapted to the production of muskmelons. ...

It is advisable to start the plants in berry boxes, or in some well-ventilated, transferring these to the open ground after the ground has become warm. ...

Drained Soil for Beans. Beans may be expected to do well on any well-drained soil, but they seem to prefer a sandy or gravelly loam of fair fertility. ...

Threshing Bean Crop. The only satisfactory method of threshing bean crops of considerable size is a bean thrasher, which may also be used for peas. ...

Spinach

Spinach thrives in a rather cool climate and attains its best development in the middle South, where it can be grown in the open ground during the winter. ...
