To Platinize Silver.

Place some platinum in a small quantity of aqua regia or platinic acid, and keep it in a warm place a few days; it will dissolve. As soon as it has dissolved, evaporate the liquid at a gentle heat until it is as thick as honey, so as to get rid of the excess of the nitric and hydrochloric acids. Add a little water, and it is ready for use. A dozen drops of this solution goes a long way in platinizing silver. The operation is performed in a small glass or beaker, covered with a watchglass to keep in the fumes, and placed in a little sand in a saucer, to equalize the heat.

Wild Goose Hides Eggs.

The domestic goose is derived from wild species. The plotter who saves their domestic eggs run wild in bushes and almost revert to their primitive state.
