If we renew the lease of that world, we shall betray the heroic dead. We shall be guilty of the basest perfidy that ever blackened a people's fame. Nay! We shall store up retribution for ourselves and our children.

The old world must end and will come to an end. No effort can shore it up much longer. If there be any who feel inclined to maintain it, let them beware lest it fall upon them and overwhelm them and their households in ruin.

It should be the supreme duty of all, without thought of partisanship, to help in the building up of the new world, where labor shall have its just reward and indolence alone shall suffer want.

Now that the war is won we have to look to the future. In economy and in work alone lie our salvation, and unless we economize and work we shall never again be in the same happy position as we were in 1914.

The society of nations may establish for the future the original status of offenses against international morals or disregard of treaties, lay down the procedure for judging the culprit, and provide for the penalty, but Count Hohenzollern's actions cannot appoint justice, and it is impossible to ask Holland to extradite her guest for political crimes not within the purview of present treaties.

The former emperor must be placed in a condition where he can do no further harm, but the eternal ideals which guarantee public and private law must be saved.
