

WATER RELIEF DEMANDED.

It is a well known fact that, for the past several years, Birmingham has been without an adequate water

At an Executive-Committeel meeting of the Birming-ham Civic Association, held Tuesday, August 10, a resolution was passed, demanding IMMEDIATE ACTION. Various plans to provide water have been proposed, but without fruitful results and the supply is yet FAR SHORT of even minimum requirements. We are told—on eminent authority—that our Village lips in the midst of abundant water sources.

It is now well established that any efforts to secure water from the operation on the Latham Farm will be greatly delayed because of court litigation.

Fingineers employed by the Village Commission have reported that it is feasible to get much relief by installing an electric pump at the present water-works to supplement the equipment now in use. Other suggestions for milror improvements for relief have been offered.

This Association has appeared before the Commission on various occasions, urging immediate action and altho the Commission has given assurance of its appreciation of our suggestions and has promised immediate action, thus far no definite plans for relief have been settled upon.
