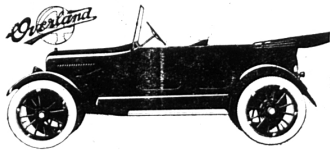

Melville Chater, home from Near East, Tells Hartwong Story of Human Misery There—Beetles and Straw for Food.

"CROUCHING by herself in a corner, a little seven-year-old girl was racking something between two stones," says Melville Chater in an article, "The Land of Stalking Death," in the National Geographic Magazine, describing conditions in Armenia. "I looked closer and found the child was eating the most common beetle."

"Under the grape vine," he noted, after questioning the girl. "I tried to find out," says Mr. Chater, "was subsisting solely on a small life of the fruit of the vine. The Near East is a land of straits, and here, in the light of the day, the children and women are so poor that they are forced to eat anything they can get their hands on, even the most common beetle. 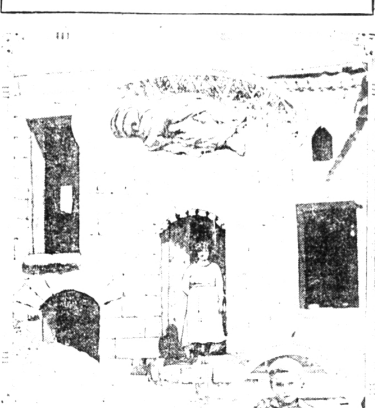
