Bruises in Furniture.
Here is a method which has been of great use in removing bruises from furniture. Wet the part with warm water, double a piece of brown paper five or six times, then soak it in warm water and lay it on the dent. Apply a warm (not hot) flannel until the moisture has evaporated. 
