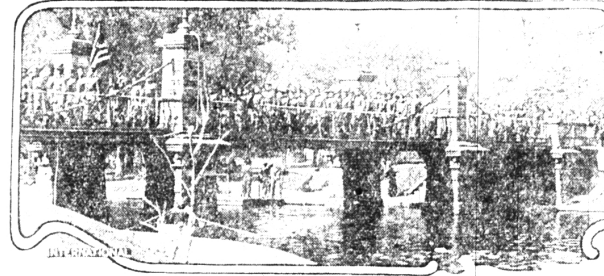

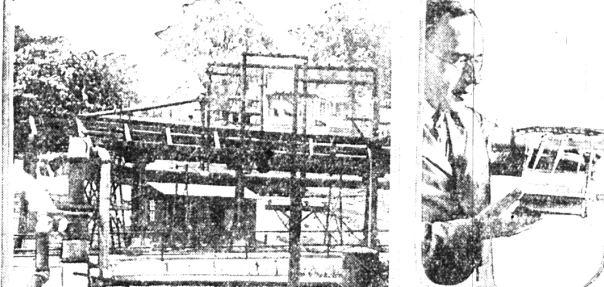

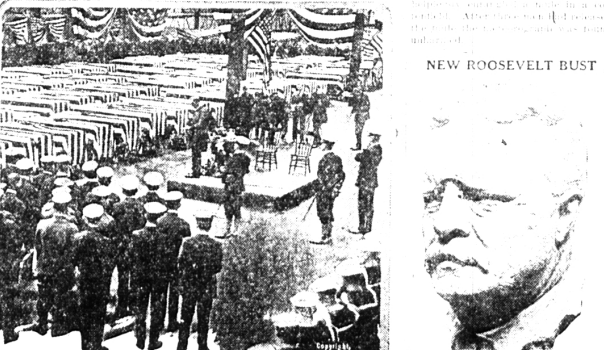

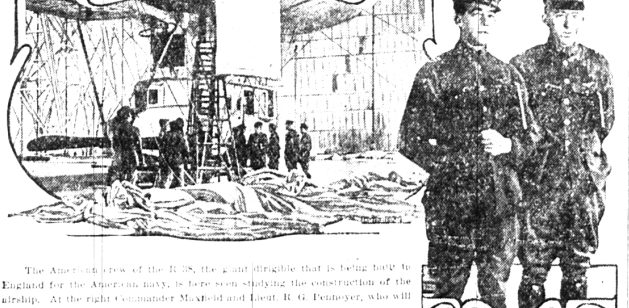
Structural damage to the Seranton, Pa., building is shown in the photograph.
