FRANK H. CARROLL

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY CLERK OF OAKLAND COUNTY

Frank H. Carroll, native of Oneida County, New York. Came to Oakland County in 1882 as Paymaster in construction of the Pontiac, Oxford & Northern Railroad. Later became auditor and was for five years Superintendent of that Railroad, resigning in 1910, when the road was purchased by the Grand Trunk Ry. System. From January, 1912, until December, 1919, was President of the First Commercial Bank of Pontiac. Was city chairman of several Liberty Loan campaigns in Pontiac, and has been Treasurer of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross since its organization in June, 1917.
