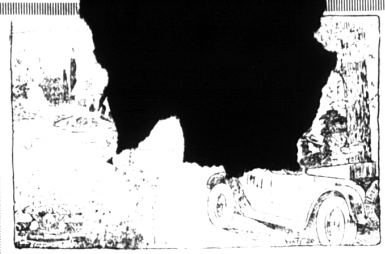

VOTERS OF BIRMINGHAM:

This letter is addressed to you by the women and men—your fellow citizens—who have placed in nomination, to fill the vacancy of President of the Village, W. D. Clizbe.

We submit the name for your kindly consideration. Numbered among Mr. Clizbe's supporters at this time are those who have not always agreed with him in all things, but they believe that the governmental affairs of our Village are in such a state as to need vigorous, definite action concerning the bigger things, this term and next.

Mr. Clizbe's knowledge of the Village is so thorough that its needs are clear to him. He needs no education on that point. His private affairs are such as to permit him to devote much of his time to the business of the Village to which he is sincerely devoted. He will be "On the Job" twenty-four hours a day.

No Voter of Birmingham objects to paying taxes, but he or she does not want those taxes wasted.

Definite and regular reports of the business of the Village Commission should be made public, that the people may be kept informed of what their Village officials are doing with their taxes. In respect to this Mr. Clizbe declares for the greatest possible publicity.

You have recently been called upon to pay your July taxes. They are a large amount—probably larger than you expected. This money is to be spent between now and next June. Let us have an Administration that will see that it is wisely and well spent.

Mr. Clizbe stands pledged to the following important and essential needs in our Village:

- FIRST.—WATER, Sufficient for Lawn, House and Fire protection.
- SECOND.—Sanitary sewer system extended to all homes in accordance with definite Birmingham plans as prepared some three years ago.
- THIRD.—County drain down Woodward Avenue to help out South end and to drain East side and make building in that vicinity possible.
- FOURTH.—No more short term Bonds to be issued without first making full facts available to the Citizens.
- FIFTH.—Lowest tax rate possible, consistent with necessary public improvements.
- SIXTH.—Full publicity of all Proceedings, to the end that our Citizens may be kept fully posted as to all activities and work of Village officials.
- SEVENTH.—Systematic planting of trees, under Village supervision and protection.

If these views meet with your approval please so signify by casting your vote in favor of Mr. W. D. Clizbe for President, at Election to be held in TOWN HALL, Merrill and Bates Streets, MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 13th. Polls open from Eight A. M. to Nine P. M.
